### Dear Constituent,

Compared to the highs of the Festive season, January can be a quiet month for many as we go back to work and focus on goals we have set for the year. If you managed to make it to the end of the month with your new year's resolution intact, congratulations!

For me, January was a very busy month. Parliament returned on January 4<sup>th</sup> and it has been almost non-stop since.

I always work hard to raise important local issues and causes in Parliament I believe in. This previous month was no exception.

In November I was contacted by a constituent about a cancer drug treatment which could have helped her husband but unfortunately it has been removed from the Cancer Drug Fund; the Government scheme to allow people to access cancer drugs not routinely available on the NHS.

After applying many times for a debate, I was finally successful in securing one this month in Westminster Hall. A cross-party group of MP's joined me and raised similar cases of constituents and personal examples of the difficulties of accessing cancer drugs.

Whilst the Minister who replied said NHS England will be looking at alternative treatments to make up for the removal of some drugs I will continue to press the Government on cancer treatments, an issue I care strongly about and I know will directly or indirectly affect, almost everyone in the constituency.

I also took the opportunity to raise a number of issues I know have been of concern in the constituency.

The approved development scheme in Oakwood has seen substantial opposition and I commend everyone in the community for the way they have come together to defend vital green wedge land.

The plans would leave ancient woodland completely surrounded by urban development leaving no pathway for wildlife who inhabit it to come and go. I asked specifically for safeguards for wildlife to be part of any new green space development plan and hope the House will debate it.

## **Record Low Unemployment Figures**

Unemployment figures for Mid-Derbyshire remain at record lows which is great news. The figure now stands at 257, down over 1,000 since May 2010.

I will be organising a Jobs Fair later this year to help those looking for work and will continue to support businesses so they can grow and employ more people.
