Dear Constituent,

Yet again June has been a busy month in both the Commons and Mid Derbyshire.

One of the biggest issues I have been dealing with is of course the delays to works on the Little Eaton roundabout. Living Melanoma Campaign and Sun in Little Eaton myself, I have first-hand experience of the frustration and disruption that the delays have caused. Nevertheless, you can rest assured that I am currently in talks with both the Transport Secretary and the Safe Schools Highways Agency to try to ensure that the work is done as quickly as possible.

Another hot topic this month is the Belper library. Many of you will be aware that the Belper library is in need of a new location, owing to the fact that large parts of the existing structure are unsafe for the public to use. I had some initial concerns about the allocation of funding for the project, yet I think it represents a great opportunity to create a social hub for the people of Belper. It would now be good to confirm a timescale for the building work to be done with an end

This month, I have also been working with closely with a number of local schools. Firstly I visited Morley Primary School to see the work they had been doing with the children to promote sun safety. I was delighted to see that the school were so keen to encourage the pupils to take care and wear sun cream, and that they had employed such innovative and fun methods to impress this message on them.

The other school I visited was Pottery Primary in Belper. I spoke to the children at length about my role as the Member of Parliament for Mid Derbyshire, and handled what I felt were some very tough questions from the children about topics ranging from mice in my office to the UK's future in Europe.

20th June marked National Care Homes Open Day, and I went along to the Laurels care home in Spondon to meet some of the residents and release some balloons to commemorate the occasion. It was a great event, and the entertainment provided by local school children was delightful.

On that same day, I opened the newly refurbished Housley Pharmacy, which is also in Spondon. I had a look at their new facilities, which were very impressive.

I hope to have lots more news to report next month!

The Relocation of the Belper Library

For some years now, there has been a need for a new library in Belper. In its current state, the Bridge Street library is not fit for purpose. It has no disabled access, which is contrary to the social inclusivity that libraries are supposed to represent and large parts of the current Belper library are unusable, due to concerns for public safety. Owing to the poor state of the building, it will not be enough to simply refurbish the building, and the library will need to be relocated entirely.

A number of years ago, the Conservative group at Derbyshire County Council inherited a fund of around £1.5 million for the redevelopment of the library, and by the end of their leadership of the Council, talks were already advanced on the plans for it.

That is why I was concerned when I heard that the Heanor library was to be relocated, and that the funds would come from those intended for the one in Belper.

It is of the utmost importance that Belper gets a new library, but I have been concerned that the fund allocated for this may be dipped into by Derbyshire County Council to pay for other projects. It is with this in mind that I have written to the Head of the Council to ask that the project be put higher up their list of priorities and that the funds reserved for the Belper library are ring-fenced.

I understand that a report has been produced by the Council on possible sites for the new library. Should you have any views on where it should go, or like me are concerned about the timings and funding of the project, I would encourage you to contact the County Council directly and let me know that you have done so. Delays to works on the A38

Over the past few weeks, I am sure many of you will have experienced extended delays on the A38 due to the slow progress of works on the Little Eaton roundabout. As a Little Eaton resident, I have personal experience of the difficulties caused by these delays.

I think it is ridiculous that works that were originally scheduled to end in March are still causing havoc for residents. The delays were reportedly due to the fact that 'rare' white-clawed crayfish were found in a brook close to the site, despite the earlier ecological surveys, carried out on behalf of the Highways Agency, failure to identify their presence.

However, when I called the Highways Agency's Director of Stategy and Planning, I was categorically told that the Agency had 'no plans' to lay on extra staff, or lengthen working hours on the site. This response did not satisfy me, so I took the matter further and wrote to both the Highways Agency and the Secretary of State for Transport to ask that working hours on the site should be extended.

The response from the Highways Agency was that they had followed best practice guidelines when moving the crayfish, and that they were looking at ways of expediting the works. I will of course keep my eye on this matter, and hold the Highways Agency to account for any further upheaval. I will endeavour to ensure that the delays and disruption caused by the works are kept to a minimum.

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As some of you may know, I have been involved in a campaign to get the drug Ipilimumab recommended by the National Institute for Health and Care Excellence (NICE) as a first line treatment for malignant melanoma.

I am pleased to say that the drug has now had approval from NICE. This will mean that late-stage melanoma sufferers will have access to this wonder drug earlier, giving them a better prognosis and quality of life. I would of course like to thank all the sufferers, the charities (Skcin and Melanoma UK especially) and clinicians that supported me in this

I have also been writing to schools about the Sun Safe Campaign that Richard Clifford and his charity Skcin are running. I am pleased to report that having visited Morley Primary School recently, the school are now teaching their children the importance of preventing excessive exposure to the sun. I was even treated to a rendition of the 'Slip, Slap, Slop' song, showing the importance of wearing sun cream!

The State Opening of Parliament
